The Fun Day will celebrate 70 years of the NHS and will include seven time zones to navigate your way through - from the Foodie 40s to the Magnificient Millenium

Join us and celebrate

Live music, a Nerf gun arena, 500 runners, great food, hospital memorabilia and a fantastic storyteller – these are just some of the attractions that will greet visitors to our special Charity Fun Day to celebrate the 70th anniversary of the NHS.

The event will be held from 11am until 5pm at the Royal Shrewsbury Hospital (RSH) on Saturday 7 July, just two days after the NHS's big birthday.

The Fun Day will follow the Fun Run that starts at 10.30am. We will have 500 runners taking part in the 5km event and everyone is invited to come along and cheer them on.

The NHS turns 70 on 5 July, making it the perfect opportunity for us to celebrate the achievements of one of the nation's most loved institutions and to thank the extraordinary NHS staff.

The Fun Day, which is being organised by The Shrewsbury and Telford Hospital NHS Trust (SaTH) will feature:

The Fun Day will have something for everyone. As well as all the things you would expect to see there will be a focus on the NHS with memorabilia from the last 70 years.

On top of this there is the 5km Fun Run, organised by the fabulous Dolly Mixtures. All runners will receive a medal, goodie bag and a T-shirt.

The Fun Day will also see the unveiling at 1pm of a sculpture which is being created by The British Ironwork Centre, near Oswestry.

The sculpture, which will take the form of a heart, is being created using old pieces of equipment that can no longer be used or repaired such as obsolete blood pressure monitors, parts of hospital beds, microscopes, a former anaesthetic machine, a broken dialysis machine and wheelchairs.

Another spectacle I am looking forward to seeing is our display of butterfly ornaments that we are selling to raise money for the Dementia Appeal. The butterflies will be on sale for a discounted £10 on the day and I expect them to sell out quickly – I for one will be buying a couple for my garden!

I look forward to meeting as many of you as possible at the Fun Day. I am excited for the celebrations to begin, and once you read this newsletter and find out a bit more about what we have planned, I am sure you will be equally excited.

Finally, I would like to add a huge thank you to the team at the Shropshire Conference Centre for allowing us to use their excellent facilities.

Meet Bevan the Bear

SaTH has teamed up with the biggest name in traditional teddy bear manufacturing to create a special souvenir to mark the 70th anniversary of the NHS.

Bevan the Bear is being created to help raise money for SaTH. He has been named after Aneurin Bevan, the founder of the NHS. He is being created in a limited run of 1,948 bears to reflect the year the National Health Service was formed.

Merrythought, based in Ironbridge, will also create a larger version of Bevan, which will be raffled for the charity. Tickets will initially go on sale at SaTH's NHS 70 Charity Fun Day.

Julia Clarke, Director of Corporate Governance at SaTH, said: "Bevan is completely adorable and we are incredibly grateful to Merrythought for creating this gorgeous bear as part of our celebrations. He will make a great gift for anyone." Sarah Holmes, Director at Merrythought, said: "Bevan is a bear that we hope people will enjoy for generations."

Unveiling of sculpture



Nurses from our hospitals have been welding items of obsolete hospital equipment onto a sculpture that is being created to mark 70 years of the NHS.

The unique heart sculpture, which is being created by The British Ironwork Centre in Oswestry, will be unveiled at 1pm.

It is being created by Shropshire artist Luke Kite (pictured below) and on Friday 25 May a number of off-duty nurses from SaTH donned their old uniforms and helped make items to be attached to the sculpture.

Karen Breese, Clinical Specialist Nurse for Dementia, who welded a broken part of a wheelchair onto the sculpture, said: "It is looking amazing and I am thrilled to have had the chance to play my part creating it.

"I have never welded anything in my life so this was a totally new experience for me. It was great fun and I am told I did a good job. I look forward to finding the piece I did when the sculpture is unveiled to the public.

"The sculpture is being designed as a heart to reflect the nation's love of the NHS and I think everyone is going to love what the artist has produced. It is so exciting!"

When welding the items onto the sculpture the nurses were supervised by Clive Knowles, owner and Managing Director of The British Ironwork Centre.

He said: "Think NHS, think hospitals and you think nurses. They are the ones who care for us and our families when either we or someone we love is taken to hospital, so to have a few of them join us today to help create this very special sculpture is most fitting.

"We are creating something that will stand the test of time and not only reflects our love for the NHS but also the kind, caring and hard-working people who work at SaTH.

"We have done one better by getting some of those wonderful people to help produce the sculpture."

The sculpture will be unveiled at 1pm as part of the official opening of SaTH's Charity Fun Day, which will celebrate 70 years of the NHS and raise funds for the organisation's Live Well With Dementia Appeal and The Swan End of Life Care Appeal.

The Academy induction is four sessions, run over four weeks and includes presentations, behind the scenes visits, demonstrations, activities and opportunities to ask questions of senior Trust staff. Enrolment in the Academy is completely free, and you will be given information about how to continue your involvement with the Trust if you choose to. Jake Evans is an award winning storyteller who has audiences young and old enthralled with his tall tales.

Throughout his childhood Jake had stories told to him by his parents, helping fuel a rich imagination.

At the age of 15 he entered the 'National Young Storyteller of the Year' competition, encouraged by the wonderful Mythstories Museum and won the U18 category with his first public performance.

However it wasn't until a couple of years later that the immense value of storytelling truly became apparent to Jake. He was lucky enough to visit Kenya twice as part of a school exchange programme and there he had the chance to perform in front of hundreds of Kenyan school children. These two trips highlighted how different cultures can mix and learn from each other through stories and inspired him to pursue storytelling as a career.

Since then, Jake has established himself as a professional storyteller based in Shrewsbury and was awarded the 'National Young Storyteller of the Year' U25 title in 2014.

He has now worked and performed across the country and abroad in schools, museums, libraries, festivals, and at many other weird and wonderful events and venues.

Nature's 90s





We will be selling these beautiful butterflies in the Nature's 90s zone to help us raise funds for SaTH Charity's Dementia Appeal.

The custom-made, handcrafted steel butterflies were officially launched at the start of Dementia Action Week (21-27 May).

Each one measures 20cm in diameter and 42cm in length, and have been made by the Oswestry-based British Ironwork Centre.

1,000 of the butterflies go will go on display for the first time at the Fun Day and will be for sale at a special rate of £10 each.

All of the profit raised from the sale of the butterflies - which will normally cost £12 - will go to the SaTH Charity's Dementia Appeal to assist our hospitals with the creation of dementia-friendly spaces and to buy equipment and resources that will help to reduce confusion, anxiety and distress for patients who have dementia.

Karen Breese, Clinical Nurse Specialist for Dementia at SaTH, said: "Each individual butterfly has been handmade by the talented team at the British Ironwork Centre and will provide a fitting memento to help us provide improved care and support for patients living with dementia.

"With 800,000 people living with dementia in the UK it is likely everyone knows someone who will benefit from this campaign.

"Anyone is welcome to purchase a butterfly, and the improvements we make today will go a long way to helping you and your loved ones in the future." The butterfly is the official symbol of the Butterfly Scheme; an initiative founded by Barbara Hodkinson to help hospitals provide a system of hospital care for people living with dementia or who simply find that their memory isn't as reliable as it used to be.

Barbara, who is fully supportive of SaTH's Butterfly Appeal, said: "The Butterfly Scheme reaches out to people living with dementia and anyone needing memory support. We are delighted to support this fabulous campaign and I look forward to joining Team SaTH at the official launch on 7 July."

The SaTH Butterflies, priced £12 each, will be available to buy from SaTH's catering outlets at RSH and PRH as of Monday 9 July. Visitors to SaTH's Charity Fun Day on Saturday 7 July can purchase them at a discounted price of £10 each.

Magnificent Millenniums

A host of local charities will be showcasing their incredible work in our Millennium zone.

The fantastic work of the League of Friends of the Royal Shrewsbury Hospital will be showcased during the day.

Amongst their many generous donations, the League of Friends helped to raise a staggering £1m to enable SaTH to buy a new MRI scanner, which was unveiled recently.

The League of Friends cares and provides support for patients at the RSH – and has since 1966. They support the work of the hospital in so many ways and are always there for patients, relatives and staff.

The 150 or so volunteers in four shops offer a smile and a cup of tea when needed, along in memory of their seven-year with other refreshments. All profits from the shops and every penny from donations, legacies and enjoyable fundraising events are used to buy equipment for the RSH. Over the last two years in the region of £1.5m has been spent on much needed equipment to improve patient care.

The Harry Johnson Trust, which offers help and support to children and teenagers who



receive care from the Oncology team at the Princess Royal Hospital, will be there. The Trust was set up in 2014 by Sally and Stephen Johnson -old son Harry, who died following a nine-month fight with Double Hit Non-Hodgkins Lymphoma. The Trust does wonderful work to provide children and teenagers with whatever they need to make things just a bit easier for them during their treatment.

Also in the zone is Lingen Davies, which will be offering insightful tours of its centre at the Royal Shrewsbury Hospital during the Fun Day.

100K Genomes Project

A Shropshire pensioner recently became the 100th patient at SaTH to have his genetic code mapped to help launch a scientific revolution in the fight against cancer and rare diseases.

Research Scientists from SaTH are working with The West Midlands Genomic Medicine Centre as part of NHS England's pioneering 100,000 Genomes Project.

The project is expected to improve the prediction and prevention of cancer and rare conditions, enable new diagnostic tests and allow treatments to be personalised.

VMI partnership

In September 2015, SaTH embarked on an exciting programme of work in partnership with the Virginia Mason Institute (VMI) in Seattle, with the aim of becoming the Safest and Kindest in the NHS.

Almost three years on and we have trained over 2,620 staff and we have over 700 staff in co-production every week. The work has saved over 3,770 miles a year of clinical staff walking, which equates to approximately 944 hours of time released back for patient care each year, alongside 57,000 safer patient journeys. **■ Find out more at the Fun Day.**

As well as all of our wonderful outdoor attractions we will also be using the Shropshire Conference Centre as an area for you to learn more about the NHS over the past 70 years.


The lobby of the conference centre will contain a large display of old photographs, memorabilia, interactive games and interesting facts of the NHS in Shropshire since it was formed in 1948.
