Staff

If you are concerned a member of staff has not cleaned their hands it's OK to remind them

You may not see staff use the alcohol hand gel at the entrances to wards but they **must** use hand gel or wash their hands with soap & water when indicated on the 5 moments for hand hygiene.

Who can you ask for information and advice?

Understanding infection can be complicated. This information leaflet may not cover all the concerns you may have about infection in the hospital setting.

Hand Hygiene



Help us to prevent infections spreading

The easiest way to pass on germs is with our hands so when staff clean their hands before and after touching each patient, it helps stop the bugs from spreading.

There are two main ways to clean hands:

Washing with soap and water

This removes germs and is best when hands are dirty. Soap and water should be used on hands if the patient is vomiting or has diarrhoea.

Using alcohol hand rub

This kills more than 99 percent of germs in around 30 seconds and dries naturally on the skin. However it should only be used on visibly clean hands.

Patients please

Always clean your hands after using the bathroom or toilet facilities and before eating. If you are not near a hand wash basin, please ask a member of staff for help. Alternatively you can also use hand wipes.


Visitors

- 2. Before an aseptic task
- 3. After body fluid exposure risk
- 4. After patient contact
- 5. After contact with patient surroundings
