It has also been suggested that training is provided to consultants to enable them to make patients feel more at ease. Having the same Consultant for each appointment also has a positive impact on the patient from the perspective of feeling at ease, less anxiety as the patient knows who they are meeting and a rapport has been built between the two individuals and also that the patient doesn't need to repeat information.
