Excisional Biopsy of the Vulva

Introduction

Your Doctor or Nurse has recommended that you have a biopsy of your vulva skin. This is when a small piece of tissue is removed and sent for examination at the laboratory. This is a procedure often done in outpatients using some local anesthetic. Once the area is numb the biopsy is taken. Please let your Doctor or Nurse know if you are on any medication. We also need to know if you take any medication which makes your blood thinner such as aspirin or warfarin as we may need to stop this prior to your procedure.

Complications are rare but can include:

Pain and soreness, excessive bleeding from the biopsy site, infection which may require a course of antibiotics, further requirement for biopsies.

Please seek further advice from your GP or Colposcopy department if you are concerned. Occasionally the vulval skin may not heal leading to wound breakdown. This is usually managed conservatively.

What to expect after the biopsy:

You may notice some spotting from the biopsy site. We would advise you to wear a sanitary pad until the spotting stops. Take simple analgesia for discomfort.

We may have used dissolvable sutures which should dissolve.

You may bath and shower as normal from the next day. It is important to keep the area clean.
